Case for CONSERVATION

Do you know giraffe populations have declined 40% in the last 30 years? Giraffe are disappearing and at high risk of extinction due to loss of habitat, bushmeat poaching, and armed conflict. In fact, there are four times as many elephants in Africa as giraffes.

Our Impact

ANTI-POACHING

Highlighting one of SGN's key anti-poaching programs in 2023.

Kamuthe Community Wildlife Conservancy, located in Garissa County in Kenya, covers 82,500 acres, and is owned and operated by the community.

SGN first partnered with the conservancy on the removal of an invasive plant species, mathenge, from the banks of the Tana River to improve water access points for wildlife, livestock, and people. In 2023 we expanded our partnership by creating a team of 12 community scouts who are trained and equipped to protect not only giraffe but all wildlife within the conservancy.

The first year of this community scout team has already led to reduced poaching activities, reduced charcoal burning and forest degradation, and increased community education on sustainable conservation practices and the importance of protecting wildlife.

Additional examples of our anti-poaching action from the past year:

- Continued funding the Northern Rangelands Trust mobile anti-poaching ranger team in Northeastern Kenya, an area highly impacted by professional bushmeat poaching led by Al-Shabaab. There has been a dramatic reduction in poaching activities of giraffe and other species since SGN started funding the unit.
- Funded the repair of two anti-poaching boats for Uganda Wildlife Authority's Marine Unit to better patrol the Nile River border of Murchison Falls National Park. The river is a key entry point for poachers entering the park.
- Increased the number of community scouts and motorbikes patrolling the Kasigau Corridor, an area located between Tsavo East and Tsavo West National Parks in Kenya, to mitigate bushmeat poaching and the making of charcoal.
- Supported the Milgis Trust community scout program protecting giraffe in the Kaisut Desert in Kenya. This small but mighty team also trains camels to assist in scout patrols, allowing the scouts to cover more ground.
- Funded the anti-poaching canine unit at Lewa Conservancy in Kenya.
- Supported de-snaring operations in South Luangwa National Park in Zambia.

Our Impact

RESCUE & REWILDING

Highlighting one of SGN's key rescue and rewilding programs in 2023.

On the shores of Lake Naivasha in Kenya's Great Rift Valley, there was a small population of Maasai giraffe who were struggling for their survival due to human encroachment on the community land. The giraffe were losing their habitat rapidly, had lost access to the lake water due to farmland fences, and urgently needed help.

In February 2023, SGN partnered with The Safari Collection, Giraffe Manor and Kenya Wildlife Service to relocate 21 of these giraffe to a safe home. Of the 21 giraffe, nine were walked into nearby protected conservancies and 12 were translocated by truck to Loldia Farm.

SGN is delighted to report the giraffes are being observed regularly in their new home and have been seen enjoying the wide array of acacia trees alongside the lake!

Additional examples of our rescue and rewilding action from the past year:

- Funded the required assessments at Ruko Community Conservancy in Kenya to prepare for a second translocation of 10 giraffe. This move will diversify the gene pool and increase the population of the highly endangered Nubian (formerly Rothschild's) giraffe.
- Translocated two giraffe in collaboration with Care for Wild to a protected area in South Africa to increase genetic diversity of the existing giraffe population.
- Continued our study in South Africa of self herding techniques to capture and transport giraffe in a safer and less stressful way than current field anesthesia and relocation procedures.



Our Impact

COEXISTENCE

Highlighting one of SGN's key coexistence programs in 2023.

SGN Head of Research, Aggrey Chemwa, is studying the impact of infrastructure on the endangered Maasai giraffes, specifically the Mombasa Highway, which is a major threat to giraffe populations in the Athi-Kapiti landscape in Kenya. By integrating roadkill and camera trap data, Aggrey is identifying the location, time, and frequency of giraffe crossings, mapping out roadkill hotspots, and identifying factors that influence giraffe highway crossings.

The study of giraffe movement across the Mombasa Highway is pivotal for addressing threats arising from habitat loss, fragmentation, and road fatalities. Investigating the distribution of giraffes along the highway and assessing risk factors associated with their crossings provides valuable insights for mitigation efforts and highway planning. Measures like speed bumps, speed limit enforcement, and underpasses, informed by this study, can reduce wildlife/giraffe road fatalities and establish safer wildlife corridors.

Ultimately, this research will contribute to harmonious coexistence, ensuring the preservation of wildlife populations while accommodating human development.


Additional examples of our coexistence action from the past year:

- Improved dams at Maanzoni Conservation Area, one of the conservancies within the Athi-Kapiti Plains near Nairobi, Kenya.
- Cleared a fast-growing, invasive plant species, mathenge, from the banks of the Tana River in northeastern Kenya. This kept previously cleared access points open and created new corridors for giraffe and other wildlife (as well as people and livestock) to reach river water during times of drought.
- Funded equipment for water pumps and fuel for expanded giraffe patrols at Bhejane Trust in Hwange National Park in Zimbabwe.
- Trained and implemented Spatial Monitoring and Reporting Tool (SMART) across key landscapes for giraffe in Kenya and Botswana.




